From the Classroom P-2

The last 2 weeks have gone by so fast! The whole class have shown a lot of interest in their English unit as we read lots of dreamtime, creation stories. The preps have been doing lots of reading and sounding out words, which they have been using to retell Traditional stories.

The year 1&2s have been doing lots of collaborative work in the classroom. In health, students explored the play yard and classroom to identify how areas could become unsafe and unhealthy, and ways we could fix it. Students have also been working in groups during maths to learn about time and the different ways we can write it.



From the Classroom 3-6

This fortnight in the 3-6 class, we having been doing a lot of learning about traditional Australian and Asian stories. Students have been learning about the historical and cultural contexts of the stories and explaining why authors make certain word choices in the description of characters.

In Technology, this term students have been looking at the different types of materials and objects that can be re-used and re-purposed. The year 5 and 6 students have been specifically looking at the way in which people accommodate for wildlife in many different environments. Students are currently looking at how they can create a safer school environment for wildlife, by inventing/ creating something where wildlife can safely co-exist on school grounds.

In PE this term, students have been working on their fitness in preparation for our school athletics Carnival in Week 10. Students participated in a circuit style workout as well as learning the skill of shotput.





Reading

Part 2 Understanding the essential components for learning to read

Effective reading requires:

 phonemic awareness phonics fluency

 vocabulary knowledge

 text comprehension

Readers develop five skills to help them read and understand:

phonemic awareness

- repeats familiar rhyming verses, chants and jingles
- identifies rhyming words
- provides a word starting with a given sound
- claps the syllables of spoken words e.g. ba/na/na
- makes new words by changing sounds e.g. swap the /p/ in spin with /k/

phonics

- identifies some letter names e.g. first letter of own name
- says some of the sounds for letters in a word
- writes letters to correspond with single letter sounds
- uses knowledge of sounds to attempt to read and spell unknown words

vocabulary

- knows and uses a range of everyday words and some subject-specific words in areas of interest
- asks questions to find out meanings of unfamiliar words
- is aware that some words have multiple meanings
- uses more precise vocabulary to describe feelings and experiences

The essential components for learning to read

text comprehension

- responds to stories by connecting information and events to personal experiences
- retells events in a story
- predicts a plausible next event in a story
- talks about information in factual texts
- analyses and evaluates a character's actions/ motives in a story

fluency

- reads aloud accurately, quickly and with expression
- automatically recognises words, word parts and letter sounds
- fluent reading allows the child to focus on the meaning of what they are reading

Cross Country Ice Blocks




Last term, the P&C arranged for everyone to receive ice blocks at the end of the Cross Country.

Burdekin River Bridge Rehabilitation Project Bruce Highway temporary closure – Night works

Monday 7 June and Tuesday 8 June 2021

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) would like to advise that the Bruce Highway at the Burdekin River Bridge, Home Hill will be temporarily closed to all traffic over two nights. This closure is to trial removing and replacing one of the sloping cord braces on the Burdekin River Bridge due to corrosion (refer to diagram below).

The trial will assist the project team in understanding the requirements, identifying any hazards, and planning for efficient and effective repairs to the remaining 39 sloping cord braces; with minimal impact to the travelling public.

For this work to be carried out, the Burdekin River Bridge must be closed to all trains and highway vehicles.

Works will be undertaken on these dates to coincide with other programmed Queensland Rail maintenance works when trains are not running along this section of the North Coast Line. Working at night will also allow the work to be completed as quickly and safely as possible, when traffic volumes are low.

Motorists will not be able to travel on the Bruce Highway at this location during the following times of closure:

between the hours of 7pm Monday 7 June to 6am Tuesday 8 June 2021 *

and

between the hours of 7pm and 10pm Tuesday 8 June 2021

* The Bruce Highway will reopen between 11.30pm Monday 7 June and 12.30am Tuesday 8 June 2021 to allow for mill shift changeover and clear queued traffic.

The Bruce Highway will reopen to traffic between 6am and 7pm on Tuesday 8 June 2021; and after the trial is completed at 10pm on Tuesday 8 June 2021. Motorists are advised to avoid the area and make alternative plans while the Bruce Highway is shut.

Queensland Police and traffic controllers will be on-site while works are underway and to ensure priority access through the work zone for emergency services only (non-emergency service vehicles will not be permitted to travel through the work zone for any reason).

Pending the outcomes of the trial, TMR will provide further notice of future repair works to the remaining 39 sloping cord braces.

TMR would like to thank motorists for their patience and understanding during these important works.
